
Activities

- Whose prints are those? Make a footprint with paint, trace your footprint on a piece of paper, or go outside and step in some dirt. Point out the different prints you see —could be a car tire on the pavement, the wet paw prints of a dog, or the small shoe outline of your child.
- **Enjoy a walk.** Whether it's the city or out in nature, enjoy a walk with your young child. Take a snack, talk about the different things you spot on the way, and notice what interests your child as they point and make gestures.

Activities



- Visit a library. Visit a library together and explore the different books available to young children. Connect with a librarian and ask about library events such as family story times, music and singing, science demonstrations, or other children's events.
- **Host a reading party.** The children gather in the library to read their chosen books. Gather a few stuffed animals, family, or friends and read your child's favorite books. Peek inside the book sleeve on *This is a Story* for a bonus poster!

Storytelling/Reading Tips

Connect the story to your child's life.

As you read stories, make text-to-self connections for you and your child. Reading becomes more meaningful when children can relate what they read to their own lives.

In *Leo Goes on a Hike*, point out how Leo and his dad get ready to leave the house such as putting on his shoes and packing snacks. Discuss how you get ready to leave the house or what snacks you eat.

When reading *This is a Story*, point out features from your life and city. Have you also seen a bridge in your city or perhaps flown a kite in the park? What kind of stories does your child enjoy reading? Find a book that interests them, such as a book about dinosaurs or horses. Visit the local library together like the family does in the story and discuss what was similar or different about your experience.
