

In this enchanting book, Melissa and Khoa bring to life the beautiful and diverse ways children around the world release their thoughts into a wish. Whimsical illustrations bring the reader on a journey around the world visiting many cultural places and artifacts.

Activities

- What is a wish? Talk about the meaning of a wish. Discuss ways your family makes wishes and ask your child what ways they would like to try making a wish.
- **Visit around the world.** Take time to visit the glossary at the back of the book to explore the countries mentioned in the book. What other cultural traditions do you know about these countries or others?
- Make a list of wishes. After reading the book, ask your child about their wishes and share a few of your own. What would they hope for or deeply desire for themselves, a loved one, or for children around the world?

Grace Habib captures the reader with delightful colors and playful illustrations in this charmingly interactive book. The grab-and-pull tabs will have your little one engaged in multiple reads!

Activities

- Play peekaboo. Play a game of peekaboo using your hands, a blanket, or another prop. Extend the activity by trying different expressions with each peekaboo. Label each emotion as you go to build your child's feelings vocabulary.
- Sing songs. Fingerplays and songs like, "Family Finger" are a great way to strengthen your child's small hand muscles and explore concepts like object permanence, the understanding that objects continue to exist when hidden or out of sight. Change the song to adapt to your family or community.
- Look and find. Ask your child to search for and find something small on each page, e.g., a butterfly, ball, or tomato, to build focus and language, and make reading together an interactive experience.
